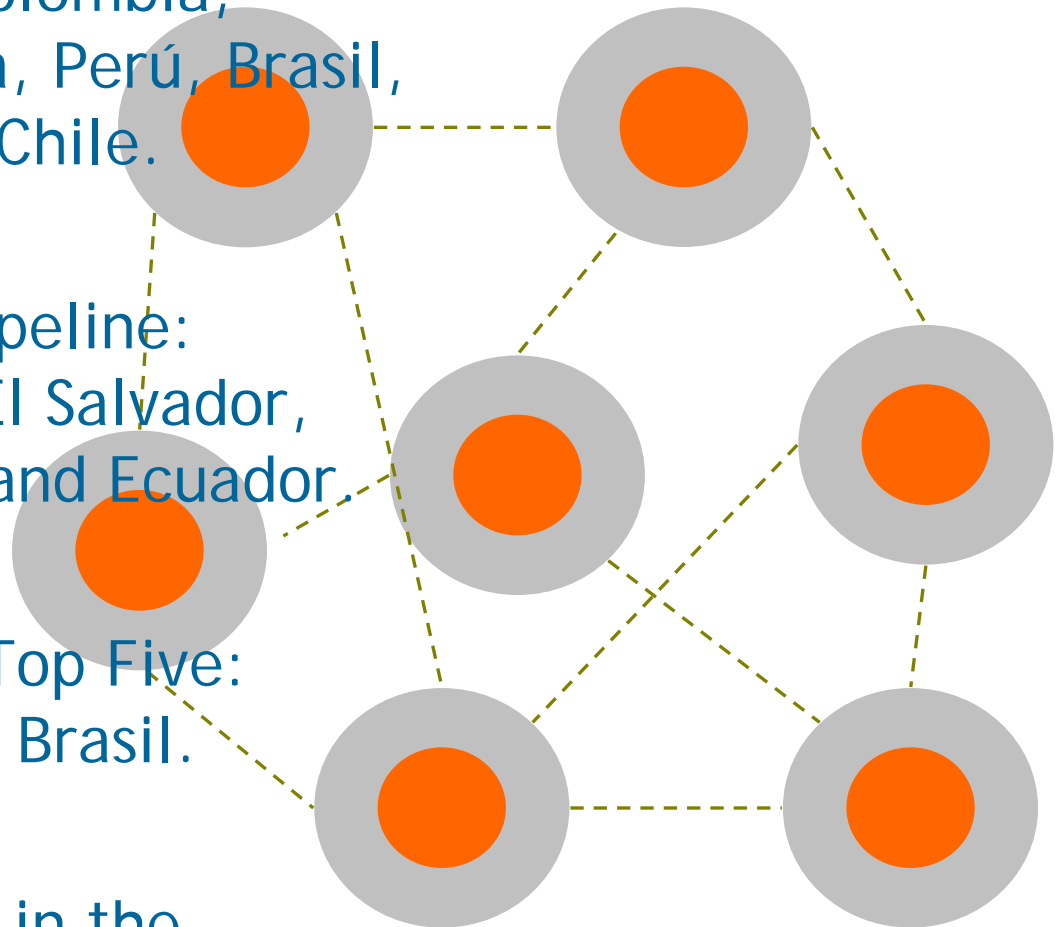

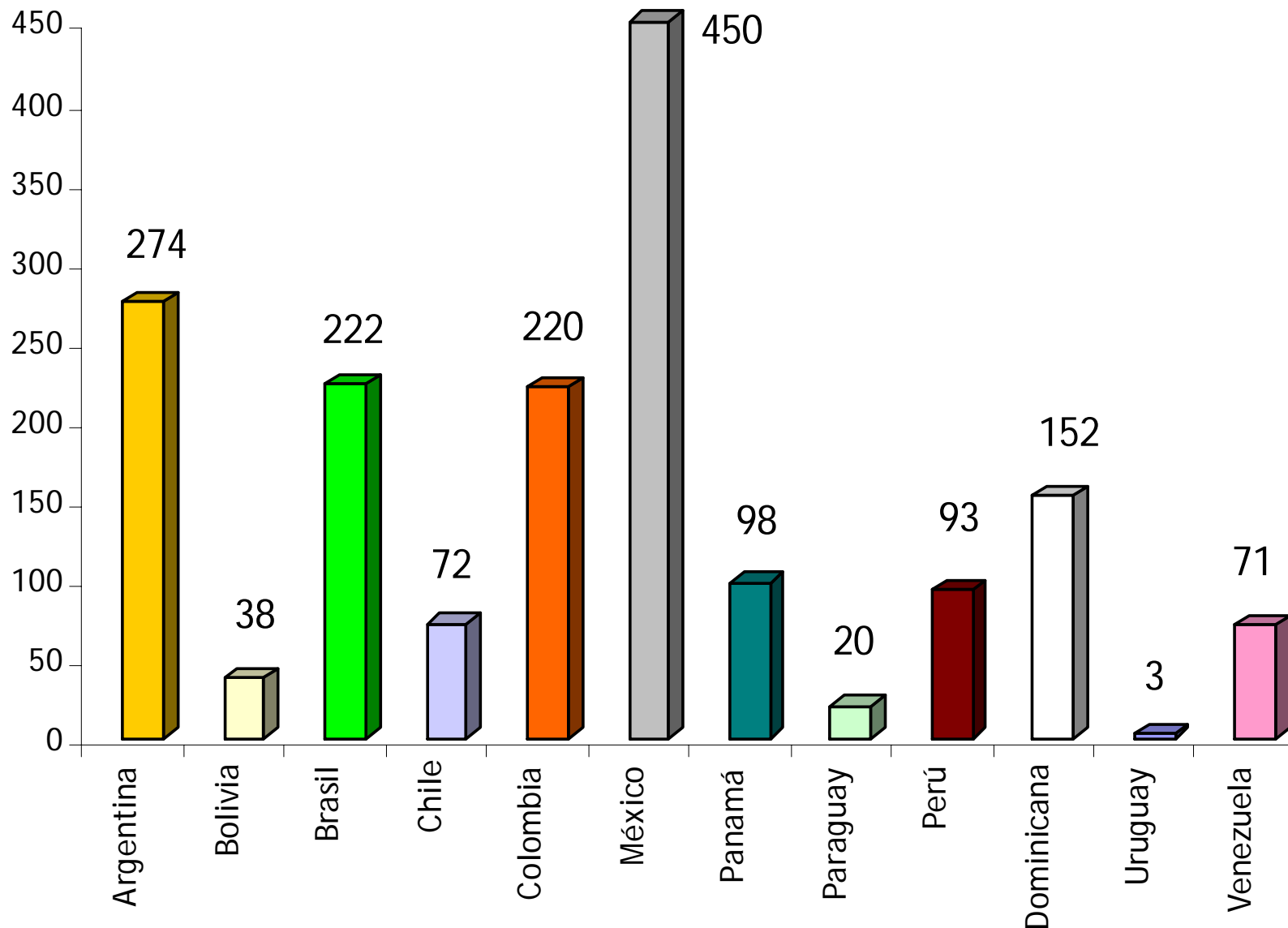
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Local Networks

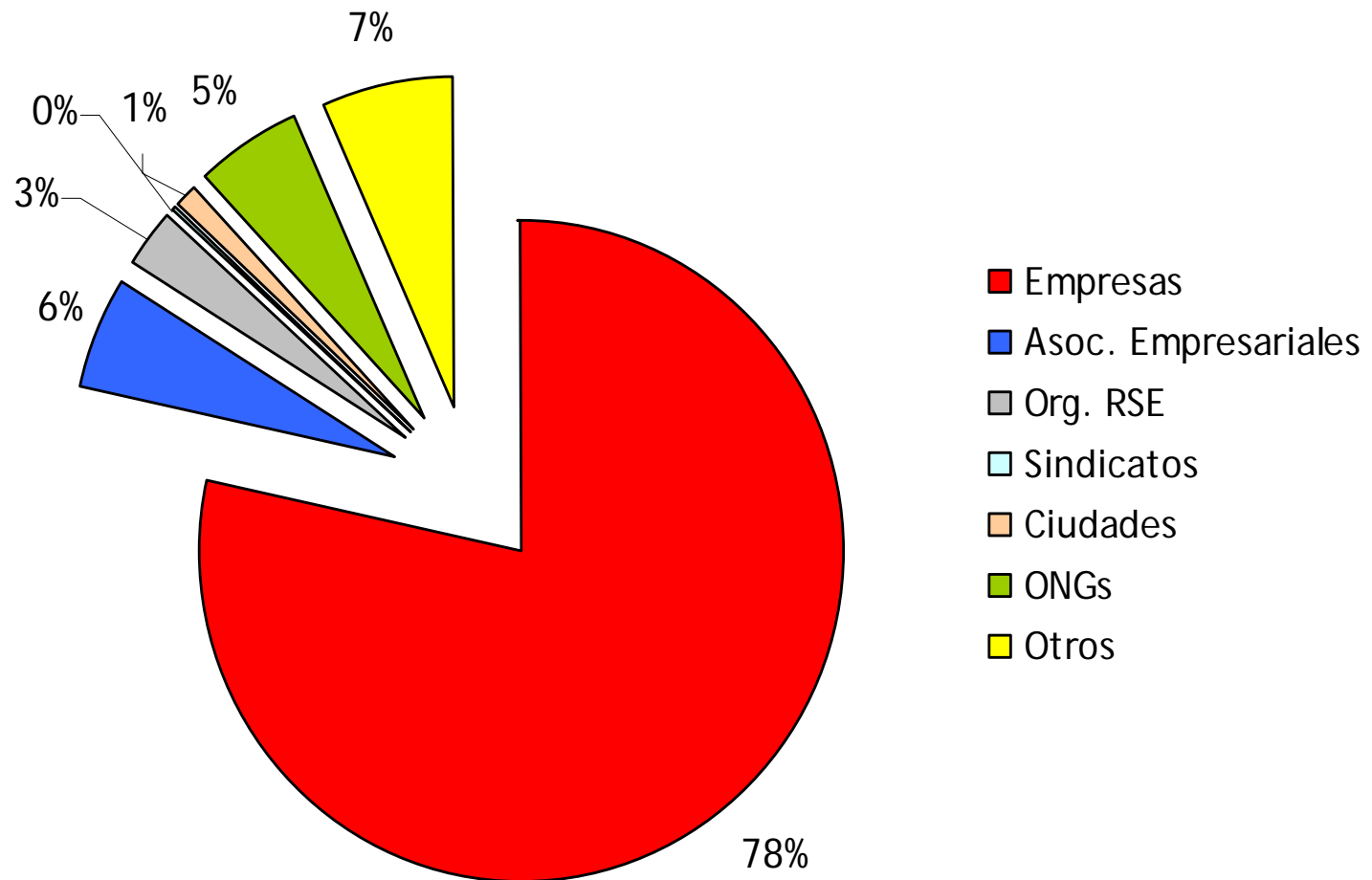
1. 10 Local Networks established:

Caribbean countries.



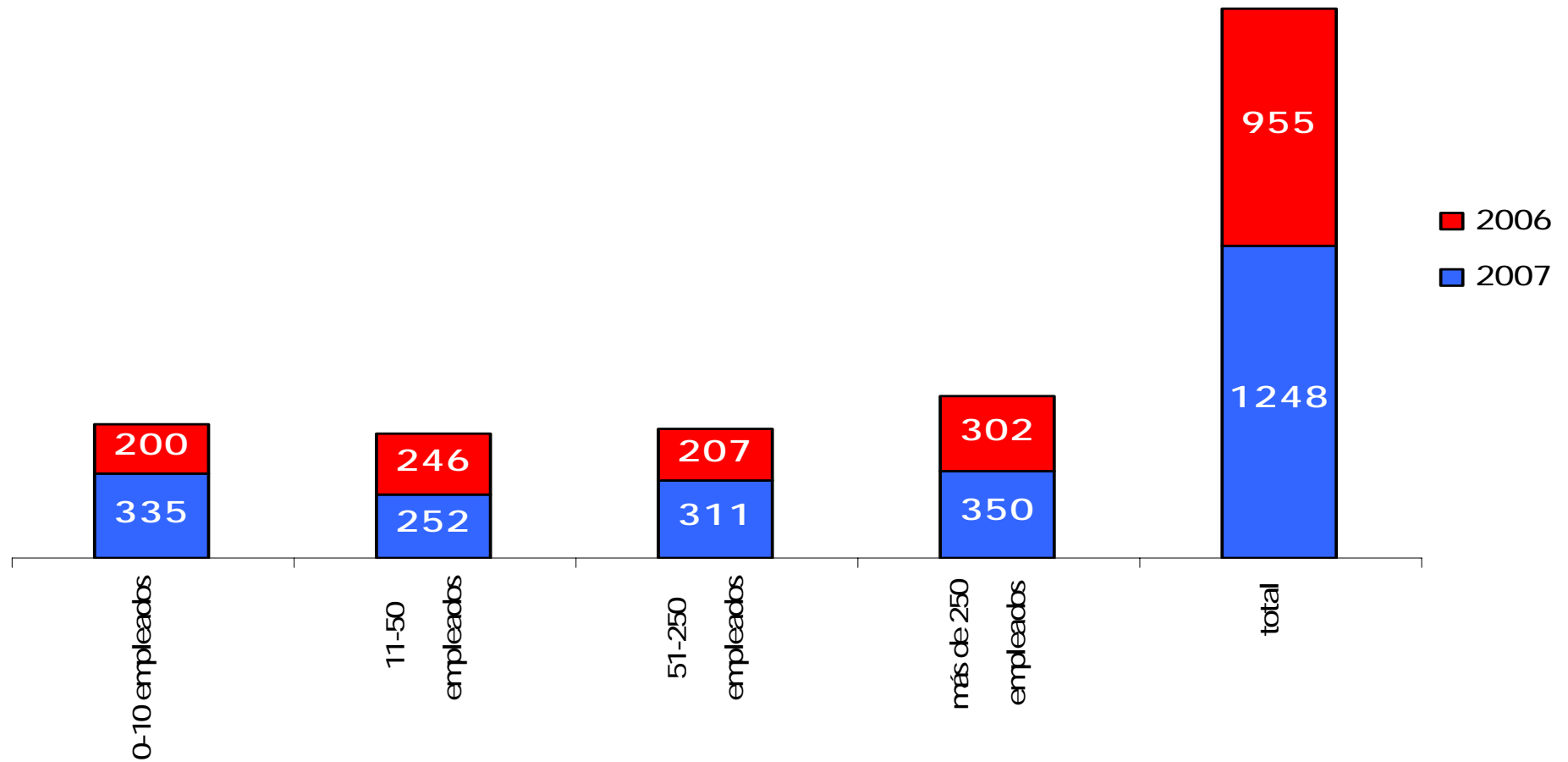
1713 participants: growth rate 17% (compared with 2006)



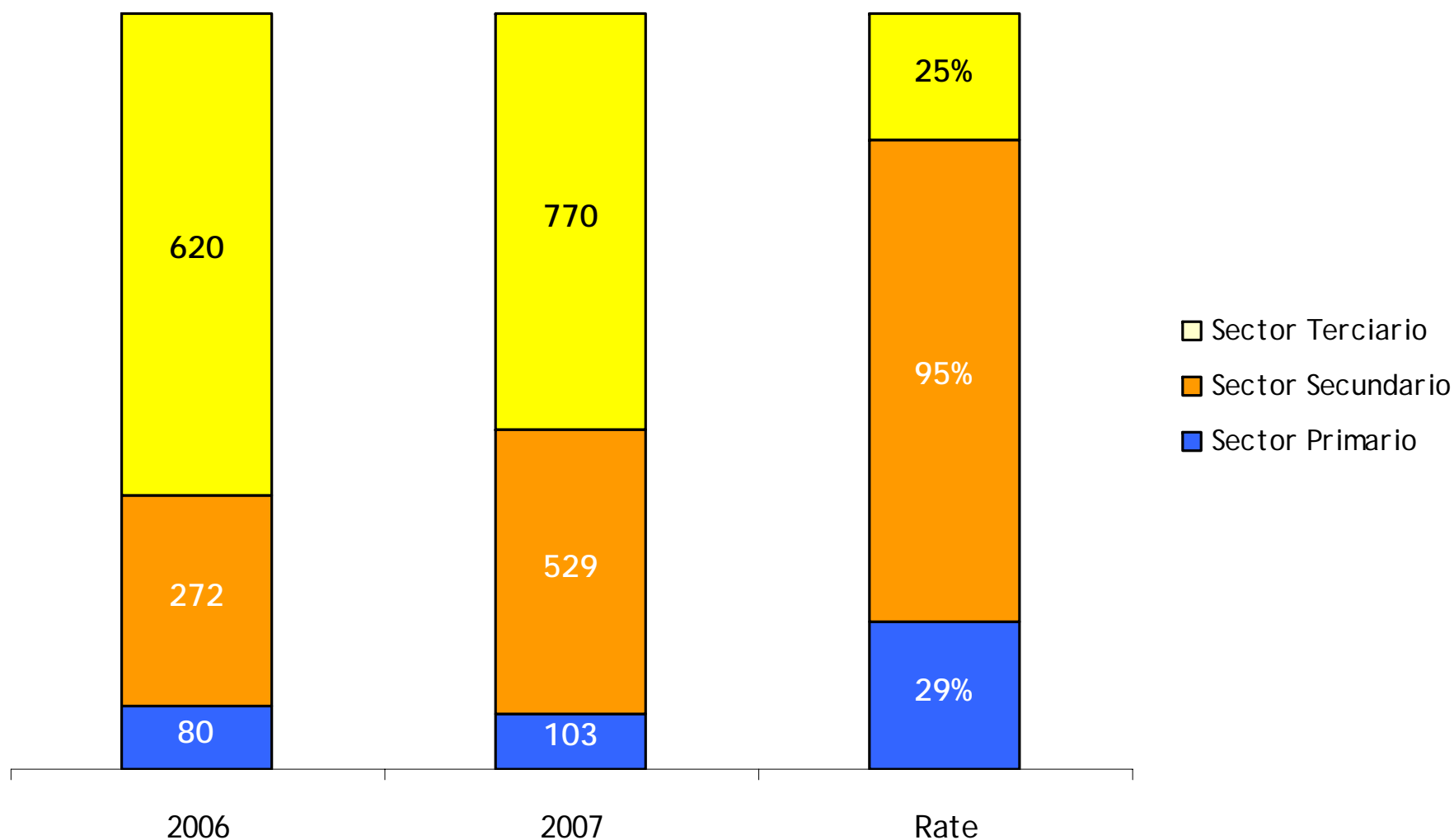
Type of organizations: multistakeholder with a prominence of companies



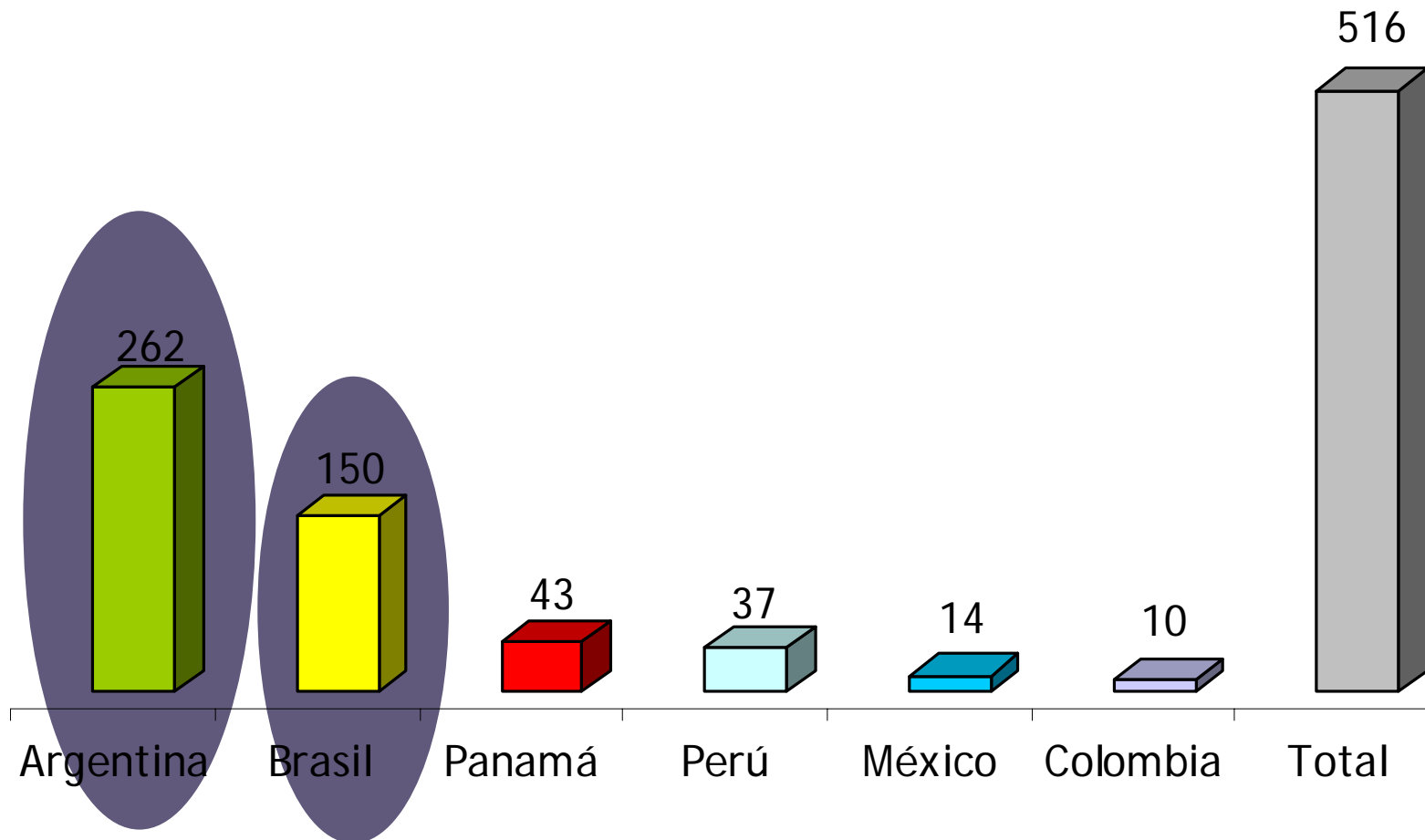
More than 70% LAC participants are SME's (companies with less than 250 employees)



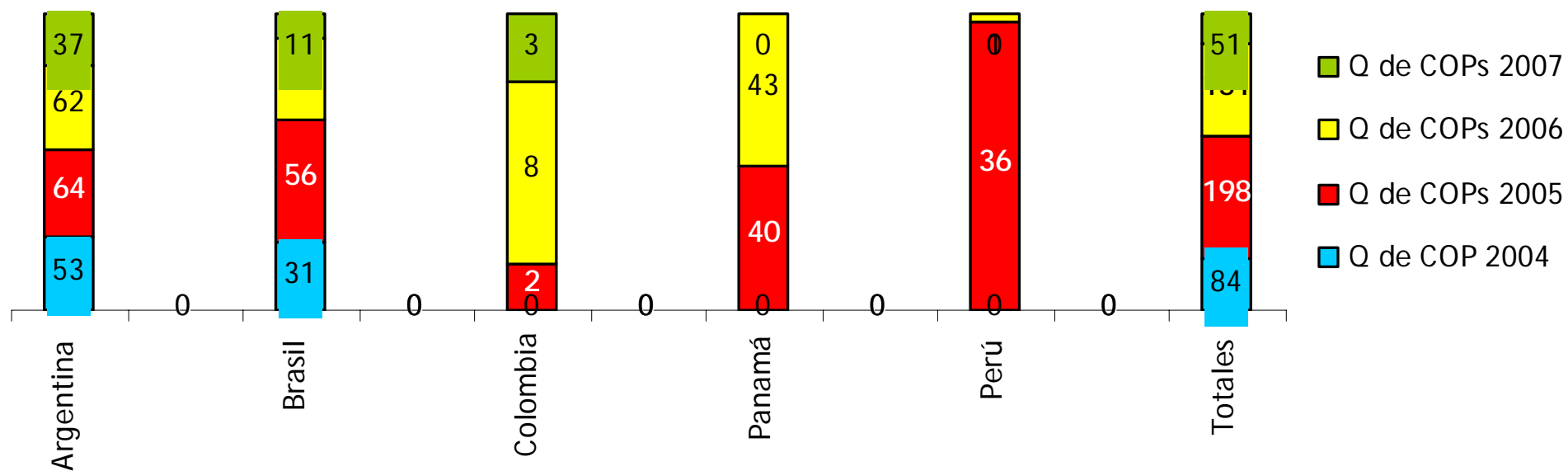
Main activities: 3rd sector (public and private services) but 2nd sector is growing!

Institutional framework

-  **Focal Point (diversity)**
 1. UN remains in 4 LNs: Argentina, México, Paraguay and Colombia.
 2. Private Sector in 3 LNs: Panamá (Asociación del Pacto Mundial), Perú (CONFIEP), and Dominican Republic.
 3. CSR organizations in Brasil (Ethos) and Bolivia (Coborse).
 4. Academic Institution in Chile (Univesidad Andrés Bello).

-  **Governance bodies**
 1. Established in Panamá, Argentina, Colombia, Brasil and Chile.
 2. In Paraguay will be ready next month.

-  **Objectives**
 1. All LNs share information among participants.
 2. All LNs offers training and learning.
 3. Colective action in 6 LNs: Brasil, Colombia, México, Panamá, Perú and Dominican Republic.
 4. Dialogue with stakeholders in 6 LNs: Chile, Argentina, Colombia, México, Panamá and Paraguay.

-  **Funding Mechanism**
 1. UN: México and Paraguay.
 2. UN and Private Sector: Argentina, Colombia and Perú.
 3. Private Sector: Brasil, Panamá and Bolivia.
 4. Others: Chile and Dominican Republic.

“Sphere of Influence”

- A fundamental sign of a multinational company’s progress is the gradual spread of commitment from Headquarters to the operations of its individual member companies.
- Create close links between subsidiaries of participating MNCs and their corresponding LNs.
- Fortify the local engagement of the subsidiaries: i.e. subsidiaries become signatories of the GC themselves.



“Regional Centre and the *Promotion Facility of UN Global Compact Projects*”

- Generate flow of information on new collective initiatives; facilitate the establishment of public-private projects, etc.
- Support the established networks and create new ones.
- Regional Centre to be established in Bogotá (Colombia) thanks to the support given by 6 companies, the Government and ANDI.
- Projects would be selected as “UN Global Compact Project”.
